### Current wildfires

---

There is currently one fire burning in the Fort McMurray area. MWF-015 is 0.01 hectares and classified as under control. The fire is located approximately four kilometres NE of Fort Chip. No communities or industrial sites are being threatened.

Since April 1, 2012, the Fort McMurray area has recorded 19 wildfires which have burned 25.58 hectares. For information on wildfires burning in other areas of Alberta, please visit the [Wildfire Status Map](#).

The wildfire burning in Wood Buffalo National Park is 44,000 hectares in size and located approximately 185 km northwest of Fort McMurray. Smoky conditions may still be present in the Fort Chip area. ### Fire restrictions

**There are currently no fire bans or fire restrictions anywhere in the Waterways area or Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo.** However, several municipalities in southern and central Alberta still have fire bans or prevention notices in effect for their jurisdictions. Please

## Wildfire prevention notices

---

Although the fire hazard has lowered across the Fort McMurray region, some northern areas are still very dry. After enjoying your campfire, make sure to soak the ashes, stir them, and soak them again. If you can feel heat, your campfire is not out. Keep soaking and stirring until your campfire is cool to the touch and make sure it is fully extinguished before leaving the site.



Remember, abandoned campfires are considered wildfires. Personnel are sent to all abandoned campfires to extinguish them, taking them away from fighting new wildfires that may have started. Do you part this summer - **soak it, stir it, and soak it again!**

Please note that in periods of **Low**, **Moderate**, or **High** fire hazard, the Industry Mailout will be issued every two days unless conditions change. Mailouts will be issued daily when the fire hazard is **Very High** or **Extreme**.
